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National OPD Criteria

The following describes the overall criteria for being in scope for the joint NHS and HMPPS OPD Pathway. Services operating as part of the OPD pathway will in addition have their own service- level criteria, tailored to the need and type of service. Details are provided in this document. For each case, a clinical and operational assessment will inform the referral and acceptance processes against the criteria of the service, and where applicable the host setting. Most services will require the national pathway criteria to be met in the first instance, however some have a broader referral catchment that also provides a service for those on the OPD pathway.

OPD Pathway national criteria	<p>For Men:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • At any point during their sentence, assessed as presenting a high likelihood of violent or sexual offence repetition; AND • Presenting a high or very high risk of serious harm to others; AND • Likely to have a severe personality disorder; AND • A clinically justifiable link between the personality disorder and the risk. <p>For Women:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Case eligible for Multi-Agency Public Protection Arrangements on their current event/ sentence; OR • Case has a High or Very High Risk of Serious Harm score on their current event/ sentence; <p style="text-align: center;">AND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Likely to have a severe form of personality disorder; AND • A clinically justifiable link between the personality disorder and the risk.
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Part A: High Secure (Health) and High Security Prisons



Rampton Hospital Men's Personality Disorder Service

Location	Nottinghamshire
Description of service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provides trauma-informed assessment, treatment, care and rehabilitation to male patients with severe personality disorder who present a grave and immediate risk to others and who require complex specialist interventions in a hospital setting. • Accommodation is in small units (9 to 16 beds), each with a therapeutic milieu and high staff: patient ratio. • The ward accommodation is supported by a Central Resource Building (CRB) offering space for the delivery of a range of psychological, education, occupational therapy treatment interventions and a healthy lifestyles programme as part of each patient's recovery and treatment pathway. • Whilst most treatments are undertaken in a combination of individual and group sessions, the same treatments are also provided on an individual basis for those who cannot manage group-based interventions. All interventions have the ultimate aim of reducing PD traits and the associated distress and reducing risk to the public or to the patients themselves. • Within the service, specialist treatment programmes are delivered in accordance with the trauma-informed treatment pathway model (journey through care). The pathway ensures that patients progress from general, motivational and introductory work on the admission ward, to the more intensive specialist programmes on the treatment wards. • The service provides assessment expertise and management support to other providers who care for patients with severe personality disorder, especially prisons and medium secure healthcare facilities.
Number of places	76 beds, consisting of a 10-bedded admission ward, three 10-bedded treatment wards, a 9-bedded high dependency unit, a 10-bedded lower-dependency treatment ward, and a 16-bedded lower risk / pre-discharge ward.
Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Length of intervention varies dependent upon individual needs
Catchment area	The North East, Yorkshire, the East Midlands and East of England
Entry Criteria	Referrals must meet the criteria identified for admission to a PD service in a high secure hospital setting. Namely, the individual must be detainable under the MHA with a diagnosed PD, with appropriate treatment being available, and present a Grave and Immediate risk to others. All referrals need to have Gatekeeper's approval (via an Access Assessment). Typically, admissions present with complex and comorbid features. Further details can be provided on contact.

Ashworth Hospital PD Service

Location	Liverpool
Description of service	The Service offers a structured and contained environment to individuals who experience complex difficulties with interpersonal relationships and coping, that can impact upon their risk and offending behaviours. Often individuals also experience mental health difficulties so medical and psychological interventions are available. On the personality disorder wards there is a consistent team, structured approach and access to occupational therapy and activities in order to improve quality of life and skills. Upon admission, a detailed assessment of personality, mental health, cognitive ability and risk is completed where appropriate. From this, an individual formulation and treatment pathway is collaboratively developed. Individuals can go into a range of treatments to help improve how they cope and to reduce their risk. This can be in a group setting or on an individual basis aimed at understanding their difficulties, improving how they cope and deal with problems, and ultimately to reduce their risk and promote positive life changes.
Number of places	Approx. 75 beds are available across 6 wards. These wards differ in level of dependency, i.e. admission/high and medium.
Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	The length of intervention is dependent upon the complexity of an individual's difficulties and their willingness to engage, but this can be long term (years). For example, a psychological intervention using a Cognitive Analytic Therapy (CAT) model might last between 2 and 6 months, whereas work using a schema therapy could take between 18 and 24 months. Often patients have complex needs, which require a range of interventions focusing upon interpersonal difficulties, coping and risk.
Catchment area	North West, West Midlands, and Wales
Entry Criteria	Individuals are admitted to the hospital under the Mental Health Act for treatment due to the grave and immediate risk they present to others. Patients who have complex needs related to personality difficulties and risk can be referred specifically to the PD service.

HMP Frankland Westgate Personality Disorder Treatment Service

Location	Durham
Description of service	The Westgate Unit delivers assessment and treatment of high-risk adult male offenders with complex personality. Its focus is to reduce the risk of serious harm presented by this group by via targeting an individual's areas of need and with consideration to the individual's personality and experience of trauma. The aim is also to enhance the quality of life of individuals whose complex needs often result in daily challenges. Adopting a multi-disciplinary approach, the clinical framework is informed by an integrated model, including psycho-social, CBT, CFT and DBT approaches. The service employs specially trained clinicians and prison officers.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	This varies according to each individual, but on average people spend between 5 and 7 years.
Catchment area	National catchment area with a focus on North of England. There is also a focus of Category A and B prisoners requiring high secure conditions, those located in Close Supervision Centres and Segregation Units and those who have previously met criteria for Managing Challenging Behaviour Strategy.
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Category A and B prisoners requiring high secure conditions or have complex needs that require more intensive treatment than that offered within lower category establishments within the OPD pathway. • Considered to have a "complex personality", as defined by the presence of personality disorder diagnoses and/or the presence of various personality traits which in combination render an individual as complex and for whom mainstream interventions and regimes have been/ or are likely to be insufficient. • Be at high risk of re-offending (measured by variety of structured assessments). • A link between personality complexity and the offences committed (assessed by combination of offence analysis and clinical developmental history). • The case is managed by HMPPS • Individuals must be aware of the referral and willing to transfer into the service.

HMP Frankland PIPE

Location	Durham
Description of service	The PIPE unit is designed to help individuals to interact with other prisoners and staff alike in a safe, friendly and productive way. In doing this prisoners will have the opportunity to practise and apply the skills that have been learned from previous group work. The aim of this is to help prisoners to prepare for their next step, whether this is to a lower category prison or release into the community.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Minimum: 6 months Maximum: 2 years
Catchment area	Any Category A prisoner in High Secure Estate
Entry Criteria	Must be a Category A adult male prisoner or a Cat B prisoner with reallocation instructions

Medication to Manage Sexual Arousal HMP Frankland

Location	Durham
Description	A service for offenders with a sexual element to their offending, where medication is offered to assist with reducing unwanted sexual rumination, preoccupation and arousal.

Residential or non-residential	Non-residential
Approx. length of intervention	As clinically advised
Catchment area	National; HMPPS may choose to move offenders into this location in order to access this service.
Entry Criteria	<p>This intervention can be offered to offenders who satisfy the conditions below whether or not they are on the OPD pathway.</p> <p>The service is for offenders with a sexual element to their offending who have psychological difficulties and distress including: Intrusive and obsessive thoughts about sex, deviant arousal or problem sexual behaviour associated with low mood or anxiety, sexual arousal or behaviour that is subjectively difficult to manage, high sex drive. Psychometrically determined sexual preoccupation.</p> <p>Degree of psychological distress is the primary consideration, but this will be compounded by risk of harmful sexual offending.</p>

HMP Whitemoor Fens OPD Treatment Service

Location	March
Description of service	The service aims to reduce the risk of offenders who are at high risk of violent and sexual re-offending and who are diagnosed as suffering from severe PD. The programme is delivered by a multi-disciplinary team. This includes prison officers, psychologists, psychotherapists, nurses and a psychiatrist, who work closely together to carry out assessment and treatment, to those that meet criteria.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	5 years
Catchment area	Southern part of the UK, but will take nationally in exceptional circumstances
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be at high risk of reoffending (measured by Risk Matrix 2000, Static 99, VRS, HCR-20 and SARN) • Have a severe PD (measured by IPDE and PCL-R) • Have a link between his personality pathology and the offences he commits (assessed by combination of detailed offence analysis and clinical developmental history)

HMP Whitemoor

Location	March
Description of service	An environment for prisoners to continue to practise and develop skills from previous treatment work, in day to day life. Staff have specialist training to help support prisoners and develop their understanding of their pro-social relationships and behaviour. This is done through maximising learning opportunities within 'ordinary' living experiences. This aims to improve prisoner's understanding of risk factors and effective management strategies. It also aims to improve access and progression through services to ensure effective risk management; this may be helping prisoners to prepare for their next step, whether this is to a lower category prison or release into the community.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Minimum: 6 months Maximum: 2 years
Catchment area	Any Category A or B prisoner in High Secure Estate
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The prisoner is a Category A/B adult male prisoner who can locate onto normal location (not a vulnerable prisoner) • The prisoner has completed high intensity offending behaviour treatment, ideally in the last 12 months • The prisoner demonstrates an acceptable level of risk that does not require immediate treatment, but needs monitoring, and will benefit from further consolidation of their skills • The prisoner has been screened into the OPD pathway or has been assessed with a personality disorder • The prisoner has a minimum of 6 months to serve or is an indeterminate sentenced prisoner • The prisoner is not currently experiencing any active mental health problems. Any current mental health problems must be manageable on normal location • The prisoner demonstrates an intellectual ability to engage in mainstream prison regime activities • The prisoner is self-motivated to engage with PIPE living and can contribute to the development of the social environment.

HMP Long Lartin Preparation PIPE

Location	Evesham
Description of service	The PIPE at HMP Long Lartin is a preparation service for convicted, category A or B, adult men who are finding it difficult to engage in the next point on their treatment pathway. It is likely that the problems that they are experiencing in achieving progression are linked with their personality functioning and that they need additional support as part of the Offender Personality Disorder pathway in order to overcome this.

Approx. length of intervention	6 - 24 months
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Men must meet the criteria for entry into the OPD pathway. • Be able and willing to commit to between 6 months and 2 years of constructive engagement on the PIPE. • Be assessed as not currently <i>eligible</i> for the next point on their treatment pathway or not currently <i>ready</i> for the next point on their treatment pathway. • Be assessed as suitable for conditions of high security. • Assessed by the PIPE team as likely to progress in response to the underpinning values and objectives of the 'Enabling Environment'

HMP Woodhill SPaR (Stabilisation, Progression and Recovery) Programme

Address	Milton Keynes
Description of service	<p>The 'SPaR (Stabilisation, Progression and Recovery) Programme' at HMP Woodhill has been funded by NHS England and OPD Services and aims to provide support, care and therapeutic input for men who have previously struggled to engage with progressive pathways within or through the prison system. The purpose of the unit is to engage both the prisoner and a team around the prisoner to provide consistent and ongoing support so that the prisoner is better able to manage his needs thereby supporting his progression through the prison onto other units whether OPD, NHS or within HMP Woodhill. The programme will work with up to 25 men who have complex needs and are resident at HMP Woodhill. All men who are on the programme will have been identified by HMPPS or the mental health team as being complex and requiring support.</p> <p>The central aim of the programme is to support men with complex needs by building upon existing expertise of staff and the team working with them. The programme will also offer a range of therapeutic groups and activities that will aim to support the prisoner to develop a better understanding into his own needs and risks.</p> <p>The SPaR Programme team will provide assessment, formulation, consultation and support informed by psychological theory. The programme will also involve proximal networks around the individual and understands such joint thinking between the prison and the mental health team is vital to the progression pathway of the prisoner.</p> <p>The SPaR programme will also work closely with the prison, Offender Management, Safer Custody, Probation and third sector organisations to support the prisoner whilst in the prison and upon progression, transfer or release.</p> <p>Each patient will receive the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • An assessment • A formulation based upon psychological theory • Goal based objectives developed in collaboration with the prisoner. • Access to a range of therapeutic groups and activities. • Support from the proximal interest group • Consultation with probation, OMU and HMPPS
Number of places	25
Residential or non-residential	All men will be at HMP Woodhill but do not need to be on a specific unit.
Approx. length of intervention	6 months to one year
Catchment area	Midlands and LTHS estate

Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The patient is struggling to engage with the usual regime within the prison• The patient requires an enhanced degree of support due to their mental disorder, including personality disorder, self-harm and disruptive behaviours.• The patient would benefit from a period of stabilisation and engagement prior to referral or transition to the OPD pathway.• The patient is currently on the Clinical Assessment Unit and would benefit from a level of activity to support their recovery.• The patient is preparing to step down from CAU and requires additional support prior to reintegrating with the main regime.• The patient has some motivation or interest to engage. We expect a level of ambivalence also.• The patient is likely to have personality disorder or personality difficulties.• The patient demonstrates patterns of violent and disruptive behaviours• The patient may have prolonged or frequent periods in healthcare and/or segregation unit.
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Part B: Category B Prisons – trainers and local prisons



HMP Dovegate Democratic Therapeutic Community

Location	Uttoxeter
Description of service	There are four treatment Communities (Avalon, Endeavour, Camelot, Genesis) within an overall Therapeutic Prison. The DTC is a high intensity offending behaviour programme for men with longstanding emotional and relationship difficulties that link to their offending.
Number of places	40 – Assessment beds, 140 – Core Therapy
Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Minimum 18 months in Core Therapy
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	<p>Every applicant is considered on an individual basis, but, in general, must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be an adult male prisoner who is Category B or below • Have at least 21 months to serve before their PED or CRD • Have a complete and up to date OASys report. • Admit to and take responsibility for their offence and be prepared to discuss offending behaviour in a group setting • Be willing to sign up to weaning off any anti-depressants within 6 months. <p>Prisoners must not:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be appealing against conviction • Have been on the Escape list or been a Category A prisoner in the last 6 months • Be in a parole window if an indeterminate prisoner • Have had a positive MDT/VDT (Mandatory/Voluntary drug test in the last two months • Be suspected of dealing in drugs • Have been on an open ACCT (Self Harm file) in the last two months • Be undergoing any form of detox (Any medication used for a detox must have been discontinued for a period of two months) • Be taking any form of psychotropic or opiate based medication for a period of two months prior to arrival. <p>Automatic applicant exclusions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Anyone who is neurologically brain damaged, either through birth or an incident later in life. Anyone who has uncontrolled epilepsy, unstable diabetes or a similar medical condition

HMP Dovegate Therapeutic Community +

Location	Uttoxeter
Description of service	TC+ is a Therapeutic Community contextualised for men with Learning disabilities who have been unable to access conventional offending behaviour programmes due to their IQ and learning style, or have struggled to retain learning from those offending behaviour programmes.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Minimum 3 years
Catchment area	National (England and Wales)
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medium and high-risk men, usually violent offences, but not always • No drug use within at least 2 months prior to referral • No self-harm within at least 2 months prior to referral • Adequate time remaining on sentence (3 years) • Admitting responsibility for their offence • Not CAT A or on Escape List • No current diagnosis of major mental illness • Use of psychotropic medication should conform with the Medication Policy • Likely to be ineligible for a general TC because of perceived learning disability

HMP Garth, The Beacon OPD Treatment Service

Location	Leyland
Description of service	The Beacon is based on a recovery and attachment model which aims to provide evidence-based specialist treatment for prisoners with personality difficulties. The underpinning philosophy is psychologically informed based on a bio-psychosocial model of PD. Individualised assessments and treatments are provided in group and individual formats, which enhance pro-social relationships, reduce risk and improve psychological well-being. A shared therapeutic model structures the service based on Livesley's (2012) phases of treatment. These phases of therapy facilitate gradual and progressive skill-building before entrenched patterns are addressed and aid the integration of a number of approaches in a coherent and structured way. The promotion of social inclusion, hope and empowerment for change are central tenets of the recovery based philosophy.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	This is dependent on individual need but it is not anticipated that this will be less than two years
Catchment area	North of England
Entry Criteria	<p>Cat B or C adult male prisoners:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Aged over 21 years. Serving a sentence of imprisonment with sufficient time to engage in treatment (at least two years) - but with less than 20 years left to serve • Assessed as presenting a high likelihood of violent or sexual offence repetition and high or very high risk of harm to self or others. Likely to have a PD/significant personality difficulties. There is a clinically justifiable link between the personality difficulties and risk. • Able to manage on normal location within the prison. <p>Prisoners are generally serving a determinate term of imprisonment of at least 4 years or an indeterminate sentence of any tariff length. They can be referred at any point during their sentence but they should have at least two years left to serve so they have time to engage in treatment and some time after to monitor and consolidate skills after they have left the unit. They will have complex needs consisting of emotional and interpersonal difficulties and display challenging behaviour of a degree that causes concern in relation to their effective management and progress.</p>

HMP Gartree Democratic Therapeutic Community

Location	Market Harborough
Description of service	A high intensity offending behaviour programme for men predominantly serving life sentences with longstanding emotional and relationship difficulties that link to their offending. The wing holds 25 community members and is accredited by The Community of Communities as part of the Royal College of Psychiatry. The programme is part of the National OPD Pathway and has consistently achieved high marks in its bi-annual audits.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Prisoners are asked to make an open commitment to therapy usually lasting up to 3 years, although the average length of stay of completers is 2 years and in exceptional circumstances has been extended to 3½ years.
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	Prisoners do not need a diagnosis of PD to apply, but do need to demonstrate motivation to change problematic behaviour and commit to a therapeutic process that can last up to 3 years. They also need to be free of psychotropic medication, such as anti-psychotics, anti-depressants, mood stabilizers and tranquilizers, or be willing to come off such medication in consultation with a GP and/or psychiatrist. Other considerations include but are not limited to previous offending, mental health history, recent substance misuse and length of recovery, and aggressive and/or violent behaviour. We do not accept applicants with current or historical sexual offences.

HMP Gartree Therapeutic Community +

Location	Market Harborough
Description of service	Therapeutic Community Plus (TC+) operates within the same framework and model of mainstream Democratic Therapeutic Communities (DTCs) in prisons. However, the approach is contextualised to support offenders with a Learning Disability (LD). The intended outcomes are the same as those for a mainstream DTC.

Approx. length of intervention	Minimum of 3 years
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	TC+ provides a specialist intervention for prisoners with LD and lower IQ, therefore it is aimed at prisoners with a full-scale IQ between 60 and 80 who are unable to access mainstream offending behaviour programmes. It is suitable for prisoners who primarily need to address violent offence-related risk, in addition to personality and psychological disorders. TC+ can be accessed by sentenced offenders with a wide range of offending needs, including violent and indeterminate prisoners whose complex needs cannot be adequately met by a single intervention.

HMP Gartree PIPE

Location	Leicestershire
Description of service	The Psychologically Informed Planned Environment (PIPE) at HMP Gartree was set up for life sentenced prisoners who have completed medium to high intensity programmes and are looking to consolidate progress and gain continued support.

Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	Minimum: 6 months Maximum: 2 years
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Must be serving a life sentence (IPP or mandatory) • Must have completed a medium to high intensity programme • Must be self-motivated (it cannot be a mandatory requirement of their sentence plan)

HMP Grendon Democratic Therapeutic Community

Location	Aylesbury
Description of service	HMP Grendon is a therapeutic community (TC) prison made up of six therapeutic communities. This includes one assessment/treatment-preparation unit and five residential communities, including one wing for men whose offending has been sexually motivated and one wing for men with learning disabilities (TC plus) – Information on this service can be found elsewhere in this Brochure.

Approx. length of intervention	Assessment period 16 – 26 weeks Main TC: 18-36 months TC Plus: Average: 36 months
Catchment area	National
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No drug use within at least 6 months prior to the referral. • No self-harm within at least 2 months prior to the referral. • Minimum of 2 years remaining on sentence. • Must not be appealing their conviction although can be appealing their sentence. • In terms of IQ the mainstream TCs are for men with an IQ of 80 and above and the TC Plus is for men with an IQ below 80. • Must not be in active denial of their offending. • Must not be a category A prisoner or on the Escape list. • No current symptoms of major mental illness or actively psychotic. • If currently prescribed opiate-based medication, you will be required to come off these prior to acceptance.

HMP Grendon Therapeutic Community +

Location	Aylesbury
Description of service	<p>Therapeutic Community Plus (TC+) operates within the same framework and model of mainstream Democratic Therapeutic Communities (DTCs) in prisons. However, the approach is contextualised to support offenders with a Learning Disability (LD). The intended outcomes are the same as those for a mainstream DTC. TC+ is a collaboration between HMPPS and NHS England.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A 20-bed wing separate from the main prison • A place to learn safely with support and respect from everyone • A place where we make decisions together • A social place where we live in a community • A place where we learn from each other • A supportive place where we can help each other
Number of places	20
Residential or non-residential	Residential
Approx. length of intervention	16-week assessment; up to 3 years treatment
Catchment area	National (although the service will where necessary prioritise referrals from London and the South East)
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • People unable to fully benefit from mainstream programmes and Therapeutic Communities because of score on cognitive ability assessments. (E.g. 55-79 on WAIS or WASI). • Life sentenced and IPP prisoners (pre or post tariff) and determinate-sentenced prisoners with at least 3 years left to serve • Category B or C prisoners • People free from drug use • No self-harm in the last 2 months

HMP Swaleside Pathways Service – Treatment Service

Location	Isle of Sheppey
Description of service	<p><i>The Swaleside Pathways Service is for high-risk offenders with emotional relationship and behavioural difficulties that prevent them completing their sentence plans. It includes a Treatment Service; provision PIPE; and Outreach service (SOS) (subsequent pages).</i></p> <p>The Treatment Service offers intensive therapeutic support for prisoners who screen into the OPD pathway, who are able and motivated to address their emotional and interpersonal difficulties. The service is offered to men on the PIPE (see below) and also men who screen into the OPD Pathway but for some reason cannot access the PIPE. The service is based on models of attachment, trauma and desistance, and provides evidence-based, formulation-driven treatment for prisoners with pervasive psychological difficulties that may meet criteria for personality disorder. Intervention follows Livesley's model of treatment: phased therapy that focusses on skills development prior to engaging in work to address more pervasive and entrenched difficulties allowing for a treatment plan tailored to the individual's needs.</p>

Residential or non-residential	Residential and non-residential
Approx. length of intervention	Dependent on individual pathway but typically 18 months
Catchment area	London, South, South East, South West of England, Wales (out of catchment cases will be considered)
Entry Criteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Men unsuitable for accredited programmes, or who have completed them but have outstanding treatment needs related to offending, emotional management and personality • May suit prisoners who are willing to engage in treatment, but unable to tolerate the intensity of a TC.

HMP Swaleside Pathways Service: Provision PIPE

Location	Isle of Sheppey

Mentalization Based Therapy

Description of service	<p>The community Offender Personality Disorder Pathway in London is delivered, in partnership by the Probation Service London (PSL), London Pathways Partnership (LPP) and representatives from Enhanced Engagement Relational Support Services (EERSS), i.e. Together for Mental Wellbeing and Women in Prison (Bluebird Service) and Housing and Accommodation Support Services (HASS), i.e. Penrose.</p> <p>The partnership delivers four Integrated Community Psychological Services (ICPS) covering the whole London region (one in each London quadrant), incorporating the Core-OM and Standard and Enhanced Intensive Intervention and Risk Management Service (IIRMS).</p> <p>In addition, an excellent package of pan-London social inclusion/service-user involvement opportunities are provided including North and South Hubs and two further specialist Hubs for women and hard-to-reach groups.</p> <p>We provide psychological input into Approved Premises and work in partnership with Penrose to deliver pan-London high intensity residential services that specialise in offering resettlement support. Description of service	<p>The TWP service supports people who identify as male and who are impacted by personality difficulties and are screened on the Offender Personality Disorder Pathway. The service focuses predominantly, but not exclusively, on young people of 18-30 years old and individuals from Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic backgrounds (BAME).</p> <p>The support offered is independent, flexible, needs-led and highly individualised; aiming to help service-users increase their levels of overall engagement and improve their ability to form and maintain stronger relationships.
